Summary of discussion	<p><i>Introduction</i></p> <p>Martin Kerry welcomed those present and explained that the structure of the meeting was designed to combine input with topic work and planning for the Collaborative.</p> <p>1. Input</p> <p>a) Mohammed Arshad, Muslim Chaplain at Bradford Teaching Hospitals presented his work on 'Islam and Chronic Pain'. Amongst other things, this demonstrated the added value that spiritual healthcare can offer to patient care. The benefits were transferable, sustainable and patient-centred.</p> <p>b) Group members found the presentation stimulating and challenging. It was suggested that an opportunity for this type of input at each collaborative meeting would be</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A way of sharing good practice</li> <li>• A way of promoting interdisciplinary understanding</li> </ul> <p>c) For the next meeting David Streatfield offered to share an aspect of good practice from his work in Clinical Education at Bradford University.</p> <p>2. Update</p> <p>a) Notes from the meeting of September 2006 were circulated for reference.</p> <p>b) Martin Kerry presented a summary of the Collaborative's work to December 2006</p> <p>3. Topics</p> <p>a) Joined up Clinical Education - Tony Ruddle and Anne Llewellyn had produced a questionnaire in order to survey education providers. Martin Kerry had put forward a revised version in light of experience with other Collaboratives. The process seemed rather stuck but Angela Hamilton reported that Chris Holroyd, Workforce Commissioning Manager at the SHA would be in a position to carry things forward.</p> <p>b) Process for Sharing Good Practice - Angela Hamilton and Martin Kerry had taken forward the group work to suggest a mechanism centred on collating reports into a newsletter. Next steps would be for the group to circulate this and find personnel to drive it. It was noted that the input dimension of the Collaborative was itself a way of Sharing Good Practice.</p> <p>c) Spiritual Needs Assessment – No progress within the group as yet, but this was an important topic that would be addressed in due course.</p>

Future Arrangements for the Collaboratives</p> <p>a) Topics</p> <p>These would be the group priorities as agreed last year:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Joined up clinical education (next meeting)</li> <li>• Process (es) for sharing good practice</li> <li>• Spiritual needs assessment</li> </ul> <p>b) Dates &amp; Venues</p> <p>The group set up the next two meetings</p> <p>June 7<sup>th</sup>/20<sup>th</sup> Bradford University – Host David Streatfield  Sept 11<sup>th</sup> Leeds Teaching Hospitals – Host Tony Ruddle</p> <p>c) Way of Working: -</p> <p>Martin Kerry was leaving the post of Lead Chaplain in April. This, combined with the reorganisation of the SHA and its functions, meant that the Collaborative would need to lead its own multidisciplinary development work.</p> <p>Practically the implications would be: -</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Each host to chair meeting and to liaise with SHA (currently Christine Waterland) over arrangements for meetings</li> <li>• SHA to send out notification of meetings, to take notes and distribute minutes.</li> <li>• The Collaborative meeting itself to agree agenda and personnel for the next meeting.</li> </ul>
